I think I have told most of you this story about my plane crash in Vietnam in 1970. When I wrote an editorial about my best friend being killed by friendly fire 3 years ago, the editor of the college paper said they were doing a Vietnam special in the NU Record and asked if had any letters that I wanted to share? Don't think she realized our main means of correspondence was tapes not letters. I had tapes but no letters then she asked about any stories. My story is on the front page of the Norwichrecord and alumni magazine.

When I first joined the 1st Cav, we were required to be forward observers first before we did anything else. Because they had an overflow of forward observers at the time, they asked if I wanted to be an aerial observer. And that was a neat job because you weren't in the field and you'd come back to your hooch every night and you had a clean place to stay. One day, I was picked up out of Quan Loi, South Vietnam, by a great pilot. He was a Cobra pilot and a fixed-wing pilot. And, we took off. We were registering batteries. He ... he was crazy. We saw a few North Vietnamese on the ground and he was shooting at them with his pistol in between registering these batteries, and I think he forgot how many hours we were in the air.

Registering took time. Sometimes it would take me 15 to 20 minutes to register one. So, three and a half, four hours went by very quickly in this birddog we were in. And the engine stopped. And the pilot looked at me and said, "Duane, we're in trouble. You better look around for an area we can land in." I picked out a road about 10 miles away. He replied, "I don't think we can make it."

Luckily, we had fuel for about 30 more seconds. We managed to get close enough, and we didn't see anything on the road as we were approaching it. But lo and behold, there was concertina wire, layers of it, all over the road. And as the plane came in for a landing, the landing gear picked up the barbwire. The plane started twisting and it flipped, took both wings off. The tail section of the thing clipped off, too. I remember him saying, "Put your head between your legs. You're going to be fine, all right? Don't look up." I'm thinking, This might not be good. I figured I'd kiss my ass good-bye.

We woke up about ten seconds later and he yelled back to me, "You all right?" I said, "I'm fine. " We'd ended up in a field. Both of us hadn't taken a leak in four and half hours so that was the first priority. I was still strapped in. I said, "I gotta go, man." We took our knives and cut ourselves out of our safety harnesses. He'd called in a Mayday. We had no idea where we were. I think I had three or four clips of ammo-we weren't supposed to be out in the field without seven. I never thought I would go down-I was a smart-ass lieutenant at the time. I was thinking, Maybe I'm going to have to use this ammo after all.

The pilot and I were picked up within a half hour. We actually landed near a small fire base that we couldn't see from the air. That was the reason for all the wire in the road. After that, I was considered bad luck in the air and they sent me to the field as a forward observer.



#### March IDT Training Highlights

The IDT weekend was successful for the organization. The battalion conducted mandatory training and events including conduct of Comprehensive Soldier and Family Fitness, OPSEC and Anti-Terrorism, MDMP Staff Training with Mission Control Training Support Program, iPERMs reviews, a WIN-T Mini-X, and other UTG requirements. Additionally the unit received an Organizational Readiness Assessment and Assistance Team (ORAAT) inspection with positive results and VIP visits from BG Swezey and BG Shields

Last Quarter's publication we discussed how the 42 ID G6 completed their proof of concept testing for Armory as a Docking Station (AaaDS) between JFHQs in Latham and the Troy, Glenmore Road Armory.

During March Drill, the 42 ID G6 expanded the unclassified point to point testing and successfully connected from the 42 ID HQs in Troy, to the 42 ID TAC in the Staten Island Armory. This is a huge achievement because it proved the units will be able to train together while remaining at their Armories, significantly reducing travel times & training costs, with no degradation to overall training value.

In addition, the Staten Island unit was able to connect to the Battle Command Common Services (BCCS) servers (see definition below), located in Troy, allowing them access to systems and services the normally would during real world missions or exercises.

New York is one of only a few states to have attempted and achieved success in AaaDS. Kudos to CW3 Collins, MSG Myers, and SFC Tremblay for taking the lead on the engineering and testing of this initiative.

Future *milestones* for this project are:

- 1) Connecting Armories over the secure network
- 2) Point to multi point connections between Armories throughout the State
- 3) Connecting to other state military facilities
- 4) Utilize Mission Training Complex (MTC) locations, via AaaDS connections, to push simulation traffic back to the Maneuver Control Systems (MCS) computers located at each Armory during training exercises.

#### Concepts of current systems for staff functions at multiple echelons:

**ABCS:** a collection of information systems that provides commanders and staffs with situational awareness & understanding & the capability to exchange necessary information across echelons and warfighting functions during full spectrum operations.

**BCCS:** a collection of server hardware and software application that provides the core Army Battle Command Systems (ABCS) interoperability services and the infrastructure necessary to employ enterprise-class services. It provides Tactical Operation Center's (TOCs) / Command Posts (CPs) at multiple echelons a localized network directory, access control and other services (collaboration servers, databases, file servers, websites, email, etc.) and networks that are operated either in a standalone configuration or part of the Global Information Grid (GIG)

**MCS:** allows commanders and staffs to visualize the operational environment and synchronize the elements of combat power for successful execution of combat operation. It is also the primary system to integrate and manage data from supporting ABCS systems onto a single map display to create a user-defined Common Operating Picture (COP).

**MTC:** a unit/facility that hosts and leads computer simulated combat environments that are "realistic, dynamic and challenging". The ABCS/MCS/BCCS are all utilized to conduct simulated exercises.

To date the CIO/G6 Network Infrastructure team has completed the installation of 250 devices at 40 Armories, and plans to complete the remaining sites by end of March, adding an additional 100 devices installed. All this will have been accomplished in an astonishing 4 month time frame.
